

COMPETITIVE SCHOLARSHIP FAQs

FELLOWS SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

1. What is the Fellows Scholarship Program?

Anderson University is home to the Presidential, Academic, and AU Fellows Scholarship program. These award opportunities are reserved for first-time freshmen students who have demonstrated exceptional academic achievement, leadership, and mission-fit to Anderson University. The ability to apply for this scholarship is by invitation only.

2. What are the various Fellows Scholarships available?

Presidential Fellows: full tuition, room, and board scholarship

Academic Fellows: full tuition scholarship and \$5,000 room stipend

AU Fellows: full tuition scholarship

3. What are the eligibility requirements for the Fellows Scholarship program?

One of the following test scores: AND the following GPA:

- 1250+ SAT or 3.5+ GPA
- 27+ ACT or
- 82+ CLT

4. How do I apply for the Fellows Scholarship program?

Students are required to submit an [application for admission to Anderson University](#). Along with their application, students will be required to submit their high school transcript, standardized test scores, resume, and two letters of recommendation.

Once students have submitted their application and corresponding materials, they may be invited to apply for the Fellows Scholarship Program based on the aforementioned eligibility requirements.

5. How are students evaluated once they apply?

Those invited to apply for the Fellows Scholarship Program are evaluated on a number of factors, including but not limited to: their essay submission, academic achievement, commitment to service, proven leadership, and mission-fit to Anderson University.

6. When is the application deadline?

Applicants must submit their required materials by December 1.

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7. What are the next steps after a student applies for the Fellows Scholarship program?

Once a student has submitted an application, it will be reviewed by key institutional leaders serving on the Fellows Scholarship Committee. The most elite and proven applicants are then chosen to be Fellows candidates and invited to attend a single-day, on-campus event where they will interact with members of the Trojan Family and future classmates, learn more about their scholarship opportunities, partake in various sessions and activities, and participate in an interview with members of the Fellows Scholarship Committee.

The Fellows Scholarship Committee will deliberate on their decisions following the event and will inform all participants of the outcome by the notification deadline.

8. How many of each Fellows Scholarship are awarded each year?

The number of awards given varies each year based on the applicant pool and the impactful impressions made on the Fellows Scholarship Committee during the competition. In previous years, we have found that quality has a much greater influence on the number of scholarships awarded rather than setting a preexisting limit of the quantity we intend to distribute. However, all participants can feel encouraged knowing numerous scholarships are generously awarded each year.

THE DENMARK SCHOLARSHIP

1. What is the Denmark Scholarship

The Denmark Scholarship is a competitive scholarship reserved for first-time freshmen. The ability to apply for this scholarship is by invitation only.

2. What is the Denmark Scholarship amount?

Students can earn as much as \$3,000 per year.

3. What are the eligibility requirements for the Denmark Scholarship?

One of the following test scores:	AND the following GPA:
- 1100+ SAT or	3.0+ GPA
- 22+ ACT or	
- 74+ CLT	

4. How do i apply for the Denmark Scholarship?

Students are required to submit an [application for admission to Anderson University](#). Along with their application, students will be required to submit their high school transcript, standardized test scores, and a Denmark essay.

Once students have submitted their application and corresponding materials, it will be reviewed by key institutional leaders serving on the Denmark Scholarship Committee.

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5. How are student evaluated once they apply?

Those invited to apply for the Denmark Scholarship program are evaluated on a number of factors, including but not limited to: their essay submission, academic achievement, commitment to service, proven leadership, and mission-fit to Anderson University.

6. When is the application deadline?

Applicants must submit their required materials by February 1.

7. Do I need to apply for the Denmark Scholarship if i apply for the Fellows Scholarship program?

No. Students who have submitted an application for the Fellows Scholarship Program will automatically receive consideration for the Denmark Scholarship.

Please note that students interested in the Fellows Scholarship Program are required to submit an application for the Fellows Scholarship Program and may not use a Denmark Scholarship submission in its place.

DIVERSITY, COMMUNITY, & INCLUSION SCHOLARSHIP

1. What is the Diversity, Community, & Community Inclusion scholarship?

The Diversity, Community, & Inclusion Scholarship is a competitive scholarship available to qualifying first-time freshmen and transfer students and is by invitation only. Applicants are encouraged to familiarize themselves with Anderson University's [Office of Diversity, Community, & Inclusion](#) and should have a vested interest in its [mission and vision](#) when considering applying for this scholarship opportunity.

2. What are the various Diversity, Community, & Inclusion scholarships available?

Students have the opportunity to earn as much as full tuition, room, and board to attend Anderson University. While this is the highest award opportunity, there are also numerous scholarships of varying amounts generously awarded each year.

3. What are the eligibility requirements for the Diversity, Community, & Inclusion scholarship program?

3.0+ GPA for first-time freshmen or 2.5+ for transfers.

Submission of an application, essay, two letters of recommendation, resume, and official transcripts.

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4. How do I apply for this scholarship opportunity?

Students are required to submit an [application for admission to Anderson University](#).

Once students have submitted their application and corresponding materials, they may be invited to apply for the Diversity, Community, & Inclusion Scholarship Program based on the aforementioned eligibility requirements. An invitation to apply will be sent via email to all eligible students by December 1 each year.

5. How are students evaluated once they apply?

Those invited to apply for the Diversity, Community, & Inclusion Scholarship Program are evaluated on a number of factors, including but not limited to: their essay submission, commitment to service, proven leadership, and mission-fit to Anderson University.

6. When is the application deadline?

Applicants must submit their required materials by January 20.

7. What are the next steps after a student applies for the DC&I Scholarship Program?

Once a student has submitted an application, it will be reviewed by key institutional leaders serving on the Diversity, Community, & Inclusion Scholarship Committee. The most proven applicants are then chosen as scholarship candidates and will be invited to attend a single-day, on-campus event where they will interact with members of the Trojan Family and future classmates, learn more about their scholarship opportunities, partake in various sessions and activities, and participate in an interview with members of the DC&I Scholarship Committee.

The DC&I Scholarship Committee will deliberate on their decisions following the event and will inform all participants of the outcome by the notification deadline.

Students selected to receive a DC&I scholarship will be required to participate in Anderson University's [I AM Mentoring program](#) once enrolled as a student.
